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Wine Tasting Celebration

This past spring, the fourth Wine Appreciation course was offered, and 37 participants met weekly at Spice Restaurant on North Street in Pittsfield for a series of six lectures and wine tastings.

Several of the wine lecturers had been presenters at the Wine Appreciation courses in the past including: Steve Dixon who spoke about Austrian wines, Ben Glick who focused on New Zealand wines and Iack Rubin who described various wines from Argentina and provided a surprise bonus session on reading and understanding a wine menu. Other lecturers were Danny May, selector of wines for Guido's Fresh Marketplace in Pittsfield, who spoke on the origins of the Pinot Noir grape and Ian Dick of Classic Wines, Inc., who highlighted wines from Burgundy.



Arline Breskin, Special Events Chair, selected cheeses to complement the wines that were sampled at each session and graciously provided her homemade pâté for the French wines. Spice very generously provided crunchy French bread for the cheeses.

Following each session, partici-

pants were invited to have a specially priced dinner at Spice. At the end of the course, OLLI members and guests were invited to attend a Gala Wine Banquet which was also held at Spice.

This was a delicious way to learn about wines and their origins.

The Accident That Inspired a Novel

It is known as the accident that inspired Edith Wharton's classic novel *Ethan Frome*, but it was a tragic accident for five Lenox young people who sledded down the icy Court House Hill and crashed into a lamp post at the Hawthorne Street intersection. According to the local Pittsfield paper, *The Evening Journal*, on March 11, 1904, Emily Crosby, a student at Lenox

High School, was steering a double ripper sled down the steep hill which was: "all a glare of ice and it grows steeper as you approach the bottom." She lost control, and the crash killed her and seriously injured her four passengers—all Lenox High School students. The town was shrouded in gloom.

In this novel, Court House Hill,

which starts at the monument in Lenox and goes down Old Stockbridge Road to Hawthorne Street, is called School House Hill. It was a popular

place for coasting and attracted locals as well as crowds of tourists and cottagers. As *The Evening Journal* reported: "...just last week a party of nearly 100 society people from New York and Boston came up to Lenox just to enjoy the coasting, sliding and skiing on Court House Hill. For fifty years there has been no place in Lenox

was living in Lenox at the time.

his wife's cousin, who has come to be Zeena's caregiver. The grim setting and tragic theme are thought to parallel Wharton's own dilemmas and mirror her own bleak years in the midst of illness and depression. When she wrote the book in 1911, her husband was suffering from a nervous disorder, and her unhappy marriage was breaking up. Her depiction of the Berkshires and its residents is grim throughout. Lenox is named Starkfield, and Ethan and Mattie plan a double suicide sledding accident as an escape from their hopeless situation. In Ethan Frome, Wharton carried this hopelessness to an extreme by using the tragic accident as the novel's climax.

Edith Wharton divorced her husband in 1913 and traveled to France where she found romance and love in her relationship with Morton Fullerton.
