OLLI • Osher Lifelong Learning Institute at BERKSHIRE COMMUNITY COLLEGE

- ♦ WHAT IS OLLI AT BCC? The Osher Lifelong Learning Institute at Berkshire Community College (OLLI at BCC) is a membership-led organization committed to the idea that learning is a lifelong, multifaceted experience. It offers courses, lectures, trips and special events year-round. Courses are given in Fall, Winter, Spring and Summer semesters.
- ♦ WHAT ARE THE MEMBERSHIP OPTIONS? The *tax-deductible* Annual Membership fee is \$50 per person and entitles members to attend classes in all four semesters and to participate in the Distinguished Speaker Series and in Special Events all year at a member rate. The *tax-deductible* Summer Membership fee is \$25 per person and entitles members to attend classes in the Summer Semester and to participate in the Distinguished Speaker Series and in Special Events programs during June, July and August at a member rate.
- ♦ WHAT ARE THE COSTS FOR COURSES AND OTHER EVENTS? Course fees per semester are \$40 for one course, \$80 for two to three courses and \$100 for unlimited courses. Distinguished Speaker lectures are \$10 per lecture for members. The cost for Special Events varies according to the event. Scholarships are available.
- ♦ WHAT IS A FLEX PASS? For those members who take extended trips or live away from the Berkshires part of the year, OLLI offers a convenient FLEX PASS. Pay \$40 to access up to four class sessions in the Summer semester or six classes in the Fall, Winter and Spring semesters from the course offerings. Restrictions are noted on the course registration page.
- ◆ ARE THERE ANY SPECIAL DISCOUNTS TO MEMBERS? OLLI has 31 Cultural Partners (see back cover) that offer programming support and, in many cases, discounts to our members. Visit www.BerkshireOLLI.org for details.

THE FENCES OF CYNTHIA OZICK

Wednesdays 10:30 – 12:00 BCC – Pittsfield Hawthorne 115 June 1, 8, 15, 22 Four sessions Read two works by one of the most incisive literary intellects of our time, Cynthia Ozick. "The Pagan Rabbi" is about a brilliant young rabbi who loses his heart to a wood nymph in Westchester, and *The Shawl* is about a Holocaust survivor living in Miami trying not to forget the past and still stay sane. These works are short but deep, poetic, political, often comical and intensely moving. There will be ample time for class discussion.

Susan Dworkin, author of 14 books and many plays; recent works include the novel *The Viking in the Wheat Field* and the play *All Day Suckers*; her play *The Old Mezzo* will be produced by WAM (Women's Action Movement) Theatre, Pittsfield; interviewed Cynthia Ozick during recording of several of Ozick's novellas.

MINI MEMOIR WRITING WORKSHOP

Thursdays 11:00 – 12:30 BCC – Pittsfield Melville 110 June 2, 9, 16, 23 Four sessions

Chronicle the times of your life and the life of your times, be it for a family legacy or possible publication. Discuss the memoir—fact or fiction—getting started, narrative drive, structure, characterization, dialogue, language and rhythm. Spend part of each session reading your work, if you wish. We will be gentle with suggestions. If you are serious about publication, we will explore writing a query letter, finding an agent and the publishing world as it exists today. Class members may bring some of their initial memoir writing to read aloud (10 minutes maximum) at the first session.

REGISTRATION IS LIMITED TO 18. Open to both new participants and previous attendees.

Ruth Sidransky, M.A., Hunter College, NYC; taught at the Austro-American Institute, Vienna, and Hunter College; founding director of the American School of Barcelona, Spain; conducted numerous writing workshops; her memoir, *In Silence*, has been translated into several languages.

GARDENS WEST AND EAST THROUGH THE AGES

TH102

Thursdays 1:30 – 3:00 BCC – Pittsfield Hawthorne 207 June 2, 9, 16, 23 Four sessions This course will offer a whirlwind tour of great gardening traditions from the ancient world to modern times. Half the course will focus on the Western world and half on East Asia.

JUNE 2 • The Roots of Western Gardens. Explore gardening practices in the ancient civilizations of Mesopotamia, Egypt, Rome and Persia. There will be an emphasis on the aesthetics of the classical garden, which greatly influenced the revival of ornamental gardening in Renaissance Europe.

JUNE 9 • Cross-Pollination and the Flourishing of the Renaissance Garden. Review the Persian/Islamic garden style and its influence on medieval European gardens. This lecture will concentrate on the continuities, changes and extraordinary development of the European garden from the Quattrocento through the Baroque.

Katherine Keenum, Ph.D., University of Texas at Austin; independent scholar; Executive Editor, Council on East Asian Studies, Harvard University.

JUNE 16 • The Traditional Chinese Garden and Its Transformation in the West. Examine the basic philosophic principles underlying East Asian gardens and then focus on the reception of Chinese gardens in the West in the nineteenth and twentieth centuries.

JUNE 23 • The Traditional Japanese Garden and Western Modernism. Consider the traditional Japanese "dry landscape" and "tea" gardens. This lecture will look at the influences of such gardens on twentieth century Modernism.

Elizabeth ten Grotenhuis, Ph.D., Art History, Harvard University; Professor Emerita, Asian/Japanese Art History, Boston University; board member of Yo-Yo Ma's Silk Road Project.
