- ◆ WHAT IS OLLI AT BCC? The Osher Lifelong Learning Institute at Berkshire Community College (OLLI at BCC) is a membership-led organization committed to the idea that learning is a lifelong, multifaceted experience. It offers courses, lectures, trips and special events year-round. Courses are given in Fall, Winter, Spring and Summer semesters.
- ♦ WHAT ARE THE MEMBERSHIP OPTIONS? The *tax-deductible* Annual Membership fee is \$50 per person and entitles members to attend classes in all four semesters and to participate in the Distinguished Speakers Series and in Special Events programs all year at a member rate. The *tax-deductible* Summer Membership fee is \$25 per person and entitles members to attend classes in the Summer semester and to participate in the Distinguished Speakers Series and in Special Events programs during June, July and August at a member rate.
- ♦ WHAT ARE THE COSTS FOR COURSES AND OTHER EVENTS? Course fees per semester are \$45 for one course, \$90 for two or three courses and \$100 for unlimited courses. Distinguished Speakers lectures are \$10 per lecture for members. The cost for Special Events varies according to the event. Scholarships are available.
- ♦ WHAT IS A FLEX PASS? For those members who take extended trips or live away from the Berkshires part of the year, OLLI offers a convenient FLEX PASS. Pay \$45 to access up to four class sessions in the Summer semester or six classes in the Fall, Winter and Spring semesters. Restrictions are noted on the course registration page.

RE-CREATING HISTORY THROUGH ROLE PLAY: The Trial of Galileo M101

Mondays 10:30 – 12:00 BCC – Melville 116 June 3, 10, 17, 24 Four sessions In this course, participants come face-to-face with the battle between science and religion. Galileo's writings rejected the Aristotelian model of the universe, which provided the foundation for the Christian world view. By attacking Aristotle (and Thomas Aquinas), Galileo threatened the power of the Catholic Church at a time when Protestantism was growing in power in northern Europe. *The Trial of Galileo* shows how a scientific dispute rocked the foundations of belief, social and political order and

international relations. By means of role play, we will go back in time to this particularly volatile period, giving you the chance to re-create history. A manual containing all the information needed for your role will assist in preparing to champion your cause.

Barbara Waldinger, Ph.D., City University of New York; teaches theater at Queens College; taught at Hofstra University and Marymount Manhattan College; Artistic Director of HRC Showcase Theatre, Hudson, NY; frequent OLLI lecturer.

An arbitrary survey of the mystery genre, featuring some of the great sleuths of fiction: C. Auguste Dupin, Sherlock Holmes, Miss Jane Marple, Lord Peter Wimsey and Philip Marlowe. We will determine how their creators—Edgar Allan Poe, Sir Arthur Conan Doyle, Agatha Christie, Dorothy Sayers and Raymond Chandler—have held society's interest for such a long time. We will listen to the stories and then discuss them. The course will

culminate with the viewing of a classic mystery film—the granddaddy of them all! No outside reading necessary, although it is hoped that the course will spur a great deal.

JUNE 12 • New understandings of dementia, changing impact on social policies, and studies on the prevention of the emergence of deteriorating states.

JUNE 19 • New state and federal laws and personal preparation for death. We will also examine the possibility of doing away with aging.

You will write a 1,000-to-2,000-word piece each week; listen to and critique fellow students' work; and see how writers as diverse as Anton Chekhov, Frank McCourt, Jim Bouton, Edith Wharton and Jhumpa Lahiri have told stories that captivate readers. **REGISTRATION IS LIMITED TO 12**. **Selection is by lottery. THE HIGGS BOSON: At the Edge of a New World

Wednesdays & Fridays 1:00 - 2:30 BCC - Hawthorne 207 June 5, 7, 12, 14, 19, 21 Six sessions The recent discovery at the Large Hadron Collider of a new particle, most likely the long-sought "Higgs boson," has captured the attention of the public and the media. The discovery has enormous impact on the future of scientific inquiry and national science leadership for our country. The funding and management of research and big science projects often necessitate government participation. What problems are caused? Should the U.S. begin building the next supercollider? This course will discuss

the discovery and the more general implications of this type of science in our culture, and explore answers to related economic issues. *No technical knowledge of science is needed—only a curious mind. But for those interested, some technical details will be made available.*

JUNE 5 & 7 • Some basic concepts underlying modern physics; the particles and fields of nature.

JUNE 12 & 14 • The crucial role of the mysterious Higgs field in our universe; what the Higgs particle is; the past, present and future of the Large Hadron Collider.

JUNE 19 & 21 • Political and economic issues related to basic research and big science projects in particular.

Matt Strassler, Ph.D., Stanford University; theoretical physicist and professor, Rutgers University; expert on string theory and particle physics; believes that science is an excellent spectator sport, one that a larger portion of the public should enjoy.

Michael Rolleigh, Ph.D., University of Minnesota; Visiting Professor of Economics, Williams College; Heller Teaching Award, University of Minnesota, 2001-04; co-founder of Pipe & Quill LLC, which developed the EconGrapher, an iOS app.

In July 1863, 150 years ago this summer, the greatest battle ever fought on American soil occurred outside a small Pennsylvania town. Filmed on location in 1992, *Gettysburg* has been called the best Civil War movie ever made. It will be shown in four hour-long segments, with time set aside in each session for discussion of the battle, the film and Michael Shaara's novel, *The Killer Angels*, on which *Gettysburg* is based.
